

"The Samaritan Shocker" Luke 10:25-37

The Common Lessons

My neighbor is one who is near me, who has a need that I can meet Even (especially) my enemy is my neighbor To be a neighbor means to show compassion, mercy, generosity, get involved

The Shocker of THIS Story

The punch of the parable lies in the Samaritan being the hero of the story: v.33

More than defining neighborliness: Jesus speaks to the man's self-justification: v.29

The story of Samaritan/Jewish enmity

Every POV traps the self-righteous questioner and catches us likewise today

POV 1: I am the Victim

I am in need of help; I cannot help myself; my own tribe cannot be trusted Kingdom neighborliness includes receiving help from the despised other Which elevates, dignifies, validates, includes, honors those typically devalued This also erases the proud "nobility" of toxic charity PUNCHLINE: Gladly and gratefully receive help from those on the margins

POV 2: I am the Villain

The priest and the Levite fail to pass the neighbor threshold: v3t-32

My religious system is inadequate to fulfill the Law

My despised Samaritan enemy is more noble than me and my tribe

Of what must I repent? Where is my theology deficient? Who is in and who is out?

PUNCHLINE: Learn from those who practice the Law without having the Law (Rom 214)

POV 3: I am the Hero

I would go the extra mile; I am the Samaritan and he is me
God can raise up children of Abraham from stones (Matthew 3:9)
You and your enemy have much more in common than what divides you
PUNCHLINE: Consider no one unclean (Acts 1033-15)

With this changed perspective, "Go and Do Likewise": v.37
