Jonah 4:5-11

Hoping for the Worst

God has relented of His planned disaster: 3:10-4:4

Jonah waits to see what will happen: 4:5

Jonah is hoping against hope that their will be a misstep

Hoping for the worst versus praying for our enemies: Matthew 5:44

In the School of YWHW

God appointed a plant, a worm, a wind: vs. 6, 7, 8
The Castor Oil Plant (ricinus communis)
Fast-growing, large-leafed, fragile plant in the Mediterranean
Interesting fact: castor oil used for lamps (a plant in service of seeing)
"To save him from his evil": v. 6

The Obvious Lesson

God's love for Nineveh is justified Kal-va-chomer: an **Argumentum a fortiori** Arguing from the lesser to the greater A speed limit example

If you can love this fragile plant (which you had no investment in making and is very temporary), surely I can love a great city (which I did create and which are eternal creatures, including many children)

Jonah's own behavior justifies God's behavior, leaving Jonah with nothing to say

The Subtle Lesson

The plant experiment is also designed to expose Jonah's kind of love with God's kind Jonah loves the plant (exceedingly glad) for the shade that it gives him Contrast: (a self-sufficient) God loves the people of Nineveh entirely for their sake What's more: God's love costs Himself

The forgiveness of Nineveh will find its completeness in the Jesus' death for the world See this love described in Romans 5:6-11

See the Kal-va-chomer in Romans 5:10 (if loved while enemies, how much more now!)

The people of God are to sacrificially love others

Jesus: Luke 6:32-36; 14:12-14

The self-test: when the scale of return versus cost tips toward cost, what then?
